






October 1st

is when the **FAFSA** and **California Dream Act Application** become available each year.

Students should complete their financial aid application early. There are significant advantages to completing your application in October.

Keep Calm but Apply Early!



How much money can I get?



Cost of Attendance (COA) – projected costs to attend institution

Expected Family Contribution (EFC), calculation of how much the student / family are expected to contribute towards their educational costs

EFC is determined by income, asset, household size, etc. reported on the financial aid application



How much Federal Student Aid can I receive?

Maximum amounts for the major programs for a dependent freshman in 2020-21:

- Federal Pell Grant: \$6,195
- Federal Work-Study: depends on funds available at school (Apply early! Average amount nationwide is approximately \$2,400/year)
- Direct Subsidize Loans: \$5,500 total per year/first year for dependent student
- Direct PLUS Loan (for parents): COA minus other aid received







How much state aid can I receive?

Our maximum, yearly state aid (Cal Grants) include:

- Up to \$12,570 at a UC for tuition & fees
- Up to \$5,742 at a CSU for tuition & fees
- Up to **\$1,656** at a **Community College** for books and supplies
- Up to **\$9,084** at a **Private Schools** for tuition & fees
- Up to \$4,000-\$8,056 at a Private, for-profit School (non WASC accredited/WASC accredited)
- \$4,000-\$6,000 maximum access award for Students with Dependent Children attending a California State School

Ints

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Apply to at least one California College Even if you are 'sure' you are going out-of-state

Apply regardless of income Don't assume you can't get any aid

Create one e-mail for all applications For college and financial aid applications, etc.

Apply early!

Students can apply beginning October 1st with either the FAFSA or CA Dream Act Application











Commission Programs

- Cal Grants A, B & C
- Middle Class Scholarship
- California Chafee Grant





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Must be enrolled at a UC or CSU

- Must be enrolled at least ¹/₂ time
- 1st Undergraduate program
- Income ≤ \$184,000
- Assets ≤ \$184,000
- Maximum UC award \$5,028
- Maximum CSU award \$2,298
- Last processed award each academic year



Only for students who have <u>less</u> than 40% of their UC or CSU fees covered by grants and scholarships



Assists current and former foster youth

- FAFSA/California Dream Act Application every year
- Chafee Grant Application (one-time)
- Up to \$5,000 per academic year
- Chafee Grant can be renewed until the age of 26
- Portable award (Eligible schools outside of CA)

Application Deadline




- **PRIORITY DEADLINE** for high school seniors and previous year high school graduates
- Students attending any Cal Grant Eligible School should apply by this date
- Cal Grant A, B, and C awards granted Entitlement & Competitive awards









- California community colleges, CSUs and UCs are always Cal Grant eligible
- Not all private schools meet the criteria to be Cal Grant eligible
- Schools must keep their federal student loan Cohort Default Rate (CDR) below 15.5 percent
- Schools must keep their graduation rate above 30 percent

• **Minimum GPA**: 3.0

- **Degree Requirements**: Baccalaureate Degree
- Award Coverage: Up to 4 years of tuition & fees at eligible California schools (no access award)
- **Community College**: Cal Grant A automatically goes on reserve for students attending a Community College

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- **GPA Minimum**: 2.0
- **Degree Requirements**: Minimum 1-year certificate, Associate or Baccalaureate degree
- Award Coverage: \$1,656 Access Award for up to 4 Years (from year one). Tuition & Fees at eligible schools for years 2, 3 & 4

• **Program requirements**: vocational, technical or occupational programs that are at least 4 months in length and up to 24 months

No GPA requirement

Special consideration: Priority occupations
 & long-term dislocated workers

Students With Dependent Children

- For students attending *public* institutions
- The Cal Grant 'A' Access award (including CCC reserve students) will increase to a maximum of **\$6,000**
- The current Cal Grant B Access award will increase to a maximum of **\$6,000**
- The current Cal Grant C books & supplies award will increase to a maximum of \$4,000





Which Cal Grant is the Best?

- **ALL** Cal Grants are beneficial
- The system will award the most beneficial Cal Grant based on the student's need, qualifying factors, type of institution and program studies
- You help students the most when you ensure GPAs are uploaded early and students are successfully completing either a FAFSA or California Dream Act Application in early October







A maximum of **\$1,298 annually** for 12 through 14 units per term

A maximum of **\$4,000 annually** for 15 units or more per term

* Available at California Community Colleges only


California College Promise Grant

(Formerly Board of Governors or BOG Fee Waiver)

- Apply online for financial aid with the FAFSA or the California Dream Act Application
- Apply online at the community college for the Promise Grant
- Note: Must be a California resident to apply
- Per-unit enrollment fees (currently \$46 per unit) are waived for eligible students

* Available at California Community Colleges only





The "No Cal Grant Zone"

- Students must meet certain income and GPA requirements to be considered for a Cal Grant
- A student may be over the income ceiling for Cal Grant B, but not have the **minimum GPA of 3.0** for a Cal Grant A
- **THOUSANDS of students** don't receive a Cal Grant because they don't meet the 3.0 GPA requirement for Cal Grant A

Dual enrollment

- Dual enrollment is generally not impactful on high school GPAs
- College classes should not be counted in high school GPA calculations unless it is high school level coursework required for high school graduation
- College units earned can only impact Cal Grant eligibility if the number of units completed at the time of application submission is high

If you received that email message dated April 17th, and you do not meet the Entitlement Cal Grant or Competitive Cal Grant requirements please disregard our email and no action is necessary by you. If you are a graduate student seeking resources, search here. Our student support service are available Monday through Friday, 8:00 am to 4:45 pm at 1-888-CALGRANT (or 224-7268) or via email at studer



In response to the Covid-19 pandemic, California Student Aid Commission (CSAC) has created a web page to help California students - especially those who may be struggling with staying in college - have access to real-time guidance and resources. 1. Create an account 7-10 days after you complete your application

- 2. Check for any pending requirements
- 3. Confirm your college of attendance
- 4. Self-certify high school graduation

Note: Remind students to double check how their names appear on their official IDs and school records before completing a financial aid application






Common Reasons for Application Issues

- Was an **on-time GPA** received? Did it match?
- Was the application submitted for the correct academic year?
- Was the **correct application** (FAFSA vs. CADAA) completed?
- Was the application submitted **on time**?
- Was the application **signed by a parent**?
- Was a paper parent **signature page** required?
- Is the student a **twin**?
- Are there **unresolved errors** on the application?
- Was an **'EFC'** generated?

Special Circumstances

In some situations a college may review and modify the student's eligibility for aid:

- Income adjustments/loss of income
- Circumstances affecting EFC / Coronavirus
- Separation or divorce (parents' marital status)
- Dependency status
- Unaccompanied homeless youths
- Death of a parent
- Adverse home situations
- High unreimbursed medical and/or dental expenses



CSS Profile (for institutional aid)

- Some private colleges ask for additional information such as home equity, income and assets from non-custodial parents, retirement plans, etc.
- Not used for awarding federal financial aid, only institutional aid from the colleges/universities
- Not all schools require. Participating institutions include USC, Stanford University, the Claremont Colleges, UC San Francisco. About 200 colleges nationally.
- Cost \$25 for app & one college, \$16 for additional colleges
- Online Registration only/File as early as October 1st






The majority will require one or more of the following:

- Application
- Essay
- Letter(s) of recommendation
- Transcript
- Interview
- Presentation
- Engage in volunteer activities









Can Private Scholarships Hurt Students?

Most financial aid offices will do their best to allow the student to keep all financial aid and scholarships that have been offered, so that a scholarship doesn't negatively affect the financial aid package.

- Need based aid (based on EFC) vs. Merit based aid
- Is the aid 'earmarked' for tuition only?
- Best advice? Talk to the college!





AB 2015 (Reyes) requires public high schools to provide instruction on how to complete the FAFSA/CADAA before students begin the 12th grade
